Ensuring Responsive Case Management Options for Persons with Intellectual and Other Developmental Disabilities and Problematic Sexual Behaviors

May 11, 2022, 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM

Session Description: While advances have continued in the assessment, treatment, and risk management of neurotypical persons with sexual behavior problems, responsive services for persons with intellectual and other developmental disabilities have lagged behind. In this interactive workshop, we will focus on methods to ensure that individuals with disabilities have the same access to evidence-based methods in sexual violence prevention. A particular focus will be on ensuring healthy sexuality options, in addition to managing situations of risk.

Presenter: Robin J. Wilson, Ph.D., ABPP is a board-certified clinical psychologist who has worked in sexual violence prevention for more than 35 years. He has published and presented widely on criminal justice topics and is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. Robin also maintains an international practice in clinical and consulting psychology based in Sarasota, Florida. His current interests center on ensuring safe transitions for clients of risk moving from institutional to community settings and maintaining responsive case management options for persons with intellectual and other developmental disabilities.
