Comparison: Remote Supports vs. Teleservices vs. AT



Remote Supports

- New waiver service
- Use of technology to monitor and respond, as needed
- Used when direct service delivery is not needed (the individual is mostly independent or uses unpaid supports)

Teleservices

- The use of technology to actively engage with an individual during waiver service delivery (direct service delivery)
- Live two-way communication

Assistive Technology

• An item, piece of equipment, or product system...that is used to increase, maintain, or improve an individual's functioning or increase their ability to exercise choice & control.



New AAW Service: Remote Supports



Remote Supports



- Uses technology that allows awake staff (with no other duties) who are not in the individual's home to monitor and respond to the individual's needs.
 - ➤ Staff must be physically located in the provider's secure facility
- Helps individuals to obtain and/or maintain independence & safety in their own home & community and decrease the need for assistance from others.
- Used during times when the individual does not require direct services
- *Internet is not covered as part of Remote Supports

Overview of Remote Supports



- Examples of provider responsibility
 - Develop plans for implementation, malfunctions
 - Training on use of devices
 - Maintenance and repairs
- Transition Period
 - Individuals starting to use Remote Supports and need help may receive in-person services (Community Support or Respite) for the first 120 calendar days
- Residential Services
 - May receive Assistive Technology for the delivery of remote supports as part of Res Hab/Life Sharing
 - Remote Supports not permitted as discrete service



Teleservices



Teleservices



Teleservices are the delivery of direct services using remote technology.

Will become effective 6 months after expiration of the public health emergency

Day Habilitation

Supported Employment

Career Planning

Specialized Skill Development

Therapies (Speech/Language, Counseling)

Nutritional Consultation

*Supports Coordination

Day Habilitation Teleservices



- May be rendered in private homes
- May only be rendered in a Residential Habilitation home when the participant:
 - ➤ Routinely participates in Day Habilitation services in-person outside the home; and
 - ➤ Has a medical or behavioral condition that precludes their inperson participation for a temporary period of time not to exceed 26 consecutive weeks.

*Maximum of 520 hours (2080 15-minute units) of Day Habilitation teleservices per fiscal year (regardless of setting)



General Guidelines for Remote Supports & Teleservices



Remote Supports & Teleservices General Guidelines



- Individual has informed choice
- Must meet an individual's needs and goals
- No recording of live interactions via audio or video
- Devices must have indicator that lets the individual know it is on
- Individual and anyone else residing in the home must understand the impact on privacy
- Must have a back-up plan


Remote Supports & Teleservices: Bedrooms & Bathrooms



- Video monitoring is not allowed in bedrooms or bathrooms
- Live audio prompts needed by the individual in the bathroom or bedroom are allowed
 - Individual must be alerted before the audio is on unless individual turns it on themselves.
- Live real-time video communication may only occur in the bedroom when:
 - > Individual has chosen to receive services in their bedroom
 - > Individual can turn the device on and off
 - Bedroom is not shared
 - Not used when privacy is needed



Changes to Other AAW Services



Assistive Technology



- Generators added for participant's primary residence
 - \$5,000 lifetime limit
 - Counts against \$10,000 lifetime limit
- Exception to \$10,000 lifetime limit
- Changes in service definition to align with ID/A waivers

Employment Services



Supported Employment:

May now be rendered when the individual is traveling out of state for work-related trips such as for a training, conference, or business trip



Supported Employment, Career Planning and Small Group Employment: Clarified provider qualifications to allow for mentoring in addition to "supervision" of a staff or individual who is working towards the competition of training or certification

Transportation



• Expenditures for Transportation is limited to \$5,000 per participant's service plan year.



Life Sharing with Relatives



- Life Sharing (licensed or unlicensed) has been expanded to be delivered by a relative.
- Who is considered a relative?
 - Parents
 - Children
 - Stepparents
 - Stepchildren
 - Grandparents
 - Grandchildren

- Brothers, sisters
- ► Half-brothers, half-sisters
- Aunts, uncles
- Nieces, nephews

Home Modifications



• At least three bids must be obtained for home modifications that cost more than \$1,000.

• The least expensive bid must be chosen, unless there is documentation from the service plan team that justifies not choosing the lowest bid.

• Participants authorized to receive Residential Habilitation (Community Homes) may not be authorized to receive Home Modifications

Supports Coordination



- Removed language about the types of assessments that are conducted and will provide this information in a policy.
- Clarified when face-to-face individual monitoring is required and when teleservice monitoring is allowed
 - One of the four required individual monitorings may be conducted remotely
 - Remote monitoring is <u>not</u> permitted for any individual receiving Residential Habilitation (Community Homes or Life Sharing)

Provider Qualifications



Provider Qualifications – General



Agency Qualifications

- Clarified which qualifications were specific to agency vs. specific to individual staff
- Aligned qualifications (where possible) with qualifications in ID/A waivers
- Used clearer language when describing requirements

Individual staff qualifications:

- Removed the requirement for a HS diploma
- Added language on ISP training that is more specific

SCO Qualifications – Agency



Supports Coordination Organizations must:

- Function as a conflict-free entity
- Have conflict of interest disclosure statements
- Have sufficient SCO personnel to carry out all functions to operate
- Have the ability to utilize HCSIS
- Cooperate with Health Care Quality Units, independent monitoring teams, and other external monitoring conducted by ODP's designees

SC Qualifications





- Bachelor's degree
- 12+ college credits in:
 Sociology, social work, psychology, gerontology, criminal justice, other related social service



- 1 year county/case management
- 12 college credits: Sociology, social work, psychology, gerontology, criminal justice, other related social service



- 2 years County
 Social Service
 Aide 3
- 2 years college: Sociology, social work, psychology, gerontology, criminal justice, other related social service



- 2 years professional experience
- 12 college credits: Sociology, social work, psychology, gerontology, criminal justice, other related social service

Res Hab Provider Qualifications



Updates to Provider Qualifications:

- Providers must be qualified and enrolled to provide Residential Habilitation/Life Sharing services in the Consolidated or Community Living Waiver
- Residential Habilitation Senior Management Personnel must be available at all times for response to emergency situations
- Residential staff must complete ODP-approved training on the common health conditions that may be associated with preventable deaths
- Residential providers must have a Supportive Technology
 Professional to ensure that remote supports provided as part of the residential service meets the needs of participants.



ODP Travel Policy



Travel Policy



Temporary travel is defined as a day in which the participant visits another destination that is away from the participant's home.

- A day includes staying away from home for at least one overnight.
- A day is when the participant is traveling, and waiver services are rendered and reimbursed.



Travel Policy



Services permitted during temporary travel:

- Specialized Skill Development:
 - Behavioral Specialist
 - Systematic Skill Building
 - Community Support
- Residential Habilitation (licensed)
- Life Sharing
- Supports Coordination
- Respite

AAW Reserved Capacity



Reserved Capacity: State Centers and Incarceration



- Added categories for Reserved Capacity:
 - > Adults with ASD leaving a state center:
 - Resided in state center for 90 or more days
 - ➤ Declared ready for discharge
 - ➤ Discharge plan cites need for long-term supports
 - ➤ Participants who have been incarcerated for 6+ consecutive months:
 - Capacity may be reserved up to 180 days prior to expected date of release

Reserved Capacity for Hospital/Rehabilitation



Clarified language for Reserved Capacity:

- ➤ ODP reserves waiver capacity for participants requiring hospital/rehabilitation care up to 180 days from the first date of leave. Reserved capacity begins on:
 - ➤ Day 31 in medical and psychiatric hospital settings.
 - ➤ Day 1 in rehabilitation care programs and nursing homes.
